<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>BIBL 115 Old Testament Literature</b> An introductory analytical survey of the Old Testament in its historical-cultural and literary context.	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>BIBL 116 New Testament Literature</b> An introductory analytical survey of the New Testament in its historical-cultural and literary context.	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>PHIL 110 Introduction to Critical Reasoning</b> Exploration of topics in informal and inductive reasoning with emphasis on recognizing and evaluating arguments and fallacies in ordinary, literary, and scientific contexts.	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>BIOL 101 Biological Science w/ Lab</b> Introductory course in biological science emphasizing the development of critical thinking skills in science, procedure skills, and content competency. Lab is required and involves scientific inquiry methods and a research component.	LEC 1 and LAB 51	4	\$260
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>BIOL 123 Nutrition</b> The nutritional requirements of human beings with emphasis on the roles of nutrients throughout the life cycle. <b>(May 17 – July 9)</b>	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>ENGL 111 Composition</b> Introduction to the thesis-support essay form, including informative, persuasive, documented, and literary analysis, with an emphasis on avoiding plagiarism. Includes strategies for organizing, writing, editing, revising, quoting, summarizing, paraphrasing, and documenting.	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>ENGL 123 Introduction to Literature</b> Introduction to understanding and interpreting literature. Literary selections drawn from various cultures and at least three common genres.	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>FIN 138 Personal Finance</b> The purpose of this course is to provide the student an overview of the role stewardship plays in one's daily life. There is a strong emphasis placed on Biblical purposes of money, attitudes towards financial wealth, and accountability for personal resource choices.	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>GOVT 170 Introduction to American Government</b> Analysis of the structure, principles, and processes of the American federal government.	LEC 1	3	\$195

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<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>HIST 111 American History I</b> Survey from the time of discovery and exploration of America through the founding and development of the 13 English colonies, the Revolutionary War, the establishment of the United States Constitution and government, the War of 1812, westward expansion and manifest destiny, states' rights, slavery, the Civil War, and Reconstruction.	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>PSYC 112 Introduction to Psychology</b> Introduction to basic procedures in the study of behavior and to elementary principles of conditioning, motivation, emotion, personality, sensation, perception, abnormal behavior, psychotherapy, and social dynamics.	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>GOEG 211 World Regional Geography</b> Regional approach to the study of the patterns that people make on the earth as the result of their political, social, economic, and cultural activities and the interaction and impact of the earth and the natural environment on people's activities.	LEC 1	3	\$195
<input type="checkbox"/>	<b>ANTH 231 Introduction to Anthropology</b> Emphasizes the basic concepts of anthropology and a survey of its sub-disciplines. Topics include ethnology, social anthropology, culture dynamics, culture and personality, anthropological linguistics, prehistoric man, physical anthropology, and the concept of race. (This course is also acceptable for 3 semester credits of the non-laboratory science requirements for the B.S. degree.)	LEC 1	3	\$195
