From the President

On Saturday, May 6, 2017, AGTS celebrated its 44th commencement in the Robert H. Spence Chapel on Evangel University's campus. My heart overflowed with gratitude for the 53 graduates who received their seminary degrees, for the professors and staff who have served these graduates, and for the many family and friends of AGTS who have supported our newest alumni with prayer, encouragement, and scholarships. Many of our graduates pursued their seminary degrees while serving in full-time ministry and caring for their families. It is clear in their stories that they were propelled by a sense of calling to pursue advanced preparation, not for professional recognition, but because of a deep desire to be equipped for even more effective Kingdom service.



Our newest graduates join 3,717 AGTS alumni—a growing community of men and women who are serving around the globe to proclaim the good news of Christ.

At the March meeting of the Seminary Board of Advisors, Dr. Mark Hausfeld recommended that, as a now fully embedded seminary, AGTS shift to a dean-directed model. In an extraordinary act of sacrificial servant leadership, he graciously offered to step aside at the conclusion of this academic year. The Seminary Board of Advisors and the University Board of Trustees received Dr. Hausfeld's recommendation and expressed their deep appreciation for his service. At our luncheon following commencement, Mark and Lynda Hausfeld were recognized. We are delighted that Dr. Hausfeld will continue to serve our Center for Islamic Studies and Urban Ministries.

After much work with an AGTS Transition Planning Team and engagement with the AGTS community, Seminary Board of Advisors, and Executive Presbyters, the Board of Trustees approved a proposal for a Vice President/Dean of AGTS as the leader for our seminary. The VP/Dean of AGTS will lead the seminary and serve as a member of the President's Cabinet and University Planning Council. We are also pleased to announce Dr. George O. Wood as the first Chancellor of AGTS. See page 10 for the story. We continue to live into the mission of AGTS to shape servant leaders with knowledge, skill and passion to revitalize the church and evangelize the world in the power of the Spirit.

FAITH OF OUR FATHERS, HARVEST OF THE FUTURE

The heritage of the past is the seed that brings forth the harvest of the future. —Wendell Philips Inscription on the National Archives Building

Robyn Buntain Wilkerson (D.Min. '17) is on the cutting edge of exciting changes in inner city ministry. She and husband Rich pastor Trinity Church in Miami. In addition, they founded and oversee Peacemakers, a ministry that feeds the hungry, mends the broken, heals the dysfunctional, teaches the uneducated, and breaks the cycle of poverty and hopelessness for families in Miami by harnessing the resources of the faith community, businesses, and government. They are changing the city by changing lives and hearts.

This is a rich harvest of seeds planted in the past. In 1994, Robyn and Rich strongly felt God's call to the inner cities. From their home base in Tacoma, Washington, they launched their outreach to cities across the continent. Then in 1998, eager to build a prototype of what they had been teaching as a new, integrated pattern of ministry they felt God wanted for America's most populous and troubled urban areas, they accepted the call to pastor in Miami.

"After months of conversation, we uprooted our brood from suburban America to ethnic, inner city ministry," Robyn explained. "Every part of our spiritual leadership was tested in a new set of circumstances. Going back to Tacoma was what I wanted to do, but our call strengthened our resolve to stay."

It was exhausting and difficult work. Some members of the all-black church watched skeptically to see just how committed this new white pastor's family would be to their church and community. But it didn't take long for them to see the Wilkersons' servant hearts. They poured themselves and their resources into the people, doing whatever was needed—picking up trash, mowing lawns, and buying food for the church breadline from their own pockets.

Key to the Wilkersons’ ministry paradigm are integrated programs designed to combat poverty, hunger, violence, joblessness, broken families, and the fallout from crime in urban neighborhoods. Such programs require a great amount of money and many partners, and finding both was a challenge. But God was about to open a door, and Robyn would find a way to walk through it.

“In 1998, I stumbled onto an advertisement in the local newspaper for a government grant,” Robyn recalled. The ad invited organizations to propose plans for providing a summer day camp for children of women involved in a welfare-to-work program.

“We were desperate for funds to continue helping those in our community, and had exhausted our

personal savings and the small amount of money the church could provide.” So, with no experience in grant writing, Robyn wrote her first proposal. To her surprise, they were awarded \$175,000! That was the beginning of their successful Summer Blast camp program that, last year, ministered to more than 1,000 kids. In the 19 years since that first grant, Peacemakers has been awarded millions of dollars in government funds to meet urgent needs in the inner city.

The initial financial strain of their new endeavor



also brought about major changes and developments in Robyn’s leadership as she transitioned to co-senior pastor. “Rich had been traveling worldwide as an evangelist,” Robyn said. “The financial situation in Miami was difficult, to say the least, and Rich had to continue traveling occasionally to help make ends meet. I began preaching when Rich was gone, and we’ve never looked back.”

“Robyn is one of the most impactful female pastors and leaders in the nation,” said Dr. Ava Oleson, AGTS professor.

In addition to preaching, Robyn excels at organization and administration. She has been vital in the launching and maintaining of Peacemakers’

many programs, including a food pantry, family center, disaster preparedness, veterans’ programs, daycare center, after-school programs, abstinence programs, parenting classes, marriage counseling, and much more.

Robyn has no doubt that God has been evident in the daily details. “Inside the routine administration of building an organization—a faith community—came the miracle of transforming me into a senior pastor.”

Her education at AGTS has been an invaluable asset in that transformation. “I have been privileged

to learn from some of the best professors while I sat in classes with other leaders from around the country and the world. With each class, I learned new knowledge that solidified my call,” Robyn said. “After each class at AGTS, I returned to Miami excited to incorporate new principles and knowledge into my ministry. I not only use the knowledge myself, I have also shared it with our church staff at Trinity and the staff of Peacemakers.”

Love for people in the inner cities has motivated Robyn and Rich to do what they can to help. But the right kind of preparation and education is vital for success. “AGTS provides a theological leadership education with our Pentecostal heritage woven through the experience,” Robyn said. And she should know a bit about Pentecostal heritage. She and husband Rich are both children and grandchildren of ministers. Her parents, Fulton and Lorraine Buntain, were also pioneers in ministry and pillars of the faith (Figuratively and literally. Fulton Buntain is one of AGTS’ Pillars of Faith recipients). Although the programs of Trinity Church and Peacemakers may seem new, they are still very much in keeping with the traditions, priorities, and vision of Robyn and Rich’s families’ ministries. Their family heritage is intertwined with the history of the Assemblies of God.

“The Buntains are a dynasty in the Assemblies of God and have contributed significantly to the impact and influence of our movement, not only nationally, but globally,” said Dr. Oleson, who was privileged to work on staff with Robyn’s father at Life

Center Church in Tacoma, one of the first megachurches on the West Coast. Like his daughter Robyn, Fulton Buntain impacted lives in his community in countless ways. He built an externally focused church, a K-12 academy, and a multi-structured retirement community. His legacy also includes founding KTBW television, which became Trinity Broadcasting Network. He was a co-founder of Mission of Mercy in India, with his brother Mark Buntain and Mark’s wife Huldah.

Robyn and Rich are the next generation in this legacy of ministry and service—but they are not the last. All four of the Wilkerson sons are involved in ministry. Youngest son, Taylor, has started Peacemakers in Harlem, and oldest son, Jonfulton, has

launched the new downtown campus of his grandfather’s church, Life Center Church, which shares Robyn and Rich’s heart for people in the city. Sons Rich Jr. and Graham play key roles in the Miami ministry programs.

New seeds are being planted even as seeds sown long ago grow to maturity and produce a harvest. Some of the angry, foul-mouthed children impacted by those first summer camps are now young adults in the church. Their lives have been changed. Some are starting to invest themselves in ministry. Robyn and Rich’s heritage is making possible a new godly heritage in countless families in Miami. Who knows what the harvest will be?

A NEW PASSION

A boy with a passion for basketball celebrated his graduation from Evangel University in May of 2017, planned to get a job teaching high school history, and coach basketball. Instead, a young man with a passion for ministry and church planting strode across the platform to claim his diploma before crossing Park Drive to continue his education at AGTS.

Jordan Deese had big plans; God had bigger plans. Evangel University was the common thread in both. "My parents attended

CBC, and they always talked about how much they loved Springfield," Jordan recalled. Evangel was always his plan A.

"My dad was involved in local church ministry. That had a huge impact on my life," Jordan explained. "That being said, ministry was the furthest thing from my mind when I was looking at college."

When he won a Founder's scholarship, everything seemed to be going according to plan. He would major in History Education, but that was just to open the door for his real passion—basketball.

This was plainly evident to all who knew him. It consumed him from 7th to 12th grades, as he lived to play on his school teams. It was the centerpiece of his future.

But an unexpected encounter with God at the Illinois District youth camp the summer before he started college changed everything. When he got home, Jordan announced that he was changing his major: God had called him into the ministry!

His mother, Sharon, was the first to recognize the magnitude of the change in her son's life. "I knew that during those two weeks of camp God had changed his heart," she explained. "When he left for Evangel, we noticed that he left his basketball in his closet. We knew then his passion had changed from basketball to ministry."

"We are extremely proud that Jordan has answered God's call to full-time ministry," Jordan's father, David, said. "From a young age, we instilled in all of our children the importance of developing their God-given abilities and talents and using those abilities to serve in a local church. But never did I imagine that the Lord would place the call to full-time ministry into the heart of my child! As a father and a minister, I am deeply humbled by that."

One of Jordan's teachers who has been "extremely impressed" by Jordan's character and ability is Dr. Michael Jaffe, professor of preaching and church leadership at Evangel University. "Jordan is an impressive young man who has answered God's call to full-time vocational ministry," Dr. Jaffe said. "While at Evangel, he has not only been an extraordinary student in the classroom, but he has also demonstrated a passion for the church."

During his four years as an undergraduate, Jordan's vision of ministry has grown. "I believe I have been called to serve and equip the local church," Jordan explained. "I have a heart and passion for healthy local churches."

In his final semester at Evangel, Jordan interned with the Church Multiplication Network (CMN), the church-planting program of the Assemblies of God, where his

passion for church planting blossomed. "Church planting provides the best opportunities for reaching into communities," Jordan said. "Now I couldn't imagine a different calling or vocation than leading in the local church."

The path to Jordan's future leads through the Assemblies of God Theological Seminary. "God honors preparation," Jordan explained. "I want to be in a position where I have prepared myself for success in whatever role God has planned for my future. The extra year of study and training is huge in the development process."

Jordan is taking advantage of a special program that allows Evangel students to maximize learning and earn an advanced degree in a short amount of time. This means that Jordan will start pursuing his Master of Arts in Christian Ministries (MACM) this fall, and he should complete his program and earn his Master's Degree in Summer of 2018. He would love to one day plant a church in one of the cities on CMN's list of 10 largest cities without a Spirit-empowered church.

"Ultimately, I want to be as prepared as possible when I go into the actual planting, as I believe that is the best way to steward the gifts and abilities God has blessed me with," Jordan said. He is excited to take the next step in his education and preparation for ministry. He is eager to learn and grow even more at AGTS. "Investing in the next generation of the church seems to be at the heart of the Assemblies of God," he said. Surely, he has seen that firsthand in the legacy of his parents and the training of his teachers, like Dr. Jaffe. He is convinced that legacy will continue through his time at AGTS.

"AGTS has trained some of the best pastors, missionaries, and leaders in the Assemblies of God," Jordan said. "It's an honor to be a part of that history."

The Promise and Significance of AGTS Today

As I begin my fifth year of service, I want to provide an update on the consolidation. As a graduate of both Evangel and AGTS and one who took additional classes at CBC while attending AGTS, I am deeply indebted to those who served at these institutions and had such an impact on the lives of tens of thousands of alumni.

The promise of consolidation was to provide enhanced ministerial training and education to serve our Fellowship. The June 2011 Consolidation Proposal established four specific goals:

1. **Maximize financial and organizational stewardship,**
2. **Significantly spur enrollment growth through integrated programming and operational efficiencies,**
3. **Enhance and expand ministerial preparation to meet the growing needs of the AG Fellowship, and**
4. **Meet 21st century challenges and opportunities in higher education.**

By aligning our theological undergraduate and graduate programs within AGTS, today the Seminary comprises one third of all Evangel University students. Our undergraduate ministry majors are now the fourth largest area of study among undergraduate students.

In a move to enhance their overall preparation for service, twenty percent of undergraduate ministry majors are double majors, pursuing both a ministry degree and a second degree. Common second majors include counseling, psychology, intercultural studies, education, nonprofit business and social enterprise, and management.

With respect to our graduate programs, Vice President/Dean of AGTS James Railey has commented, “The graduate programs of AGTS continue to produce men and women who are the best reflection of our mission to shape servant leaders with knowledge, skill and passion to revitalize the Church and evangelize the world in the power of the Holy Spirit. In May, we commissioned another 53 AGTS graduates, many of whom are already serving in places of significant influence and ministry.”

Current AGTS students and alumni who participated in a series of focus groups this year reported that pursuing their theological education at AGTS was life-changing. They told stories of how they enjoyed the depth of academic scholarship infused with the breath of God as the Holy Spirit was invited into their academic pursuits. They commented on how effectively professors balance theory with praxis, igniting a lifelong love of learning and service in the power of the Holy Spirit.

In early March, a diverse group of ministry leaders participated in a focus group in response to the AGTS core initiative on envisioning the Seminary's preferred future, especially focused on ministry preparation.

One of the key outcomes of the meeting was a clear reaffirmation that the Seminary was founded and continues to exist to serve our Fellowship with graduate level applied scholarship designed to equip ministers, missionaries, and chaplains for effective service as Pentecostal ministry leaders. Where those three elements come together – Serve the Fellowship, Equip with applied scholarship, Live our Pentecostal identity – is AGTS's "sweet spot."

A key partner in the mission of AGTS is Dr. Beth Grant, Chair of the Seminary Board of Advisors, member of the Board of Trustees, AGWM leader, Executive Presbyterian, and highly regarded missionary.

Following our recent meetings, Dr. Grant stated: "From its inception, AGTS has been uniquely linked with Assemblies of God World Missions to equip Spirit-empowered missionaries. The Seminary Board of Advisors along with Evangel University leadership has reaffirmed this essential strategic partnership. As growing numbers of EU undergrad students prepare for global ministry in community with Global Missions seminary faculty and students, there is a new sense of synergy, urgency and vision. We pray that seminary students and undergrad ministry students alike will experience 'knowledge on fire' for their shared mission of taking Jesus to the nations."

Maximizing Stewardship

Since the first year of implementation of the consolidation in 2013-2014, we have realized a savings of \$1.8M in operational expenses at AGTS. This was achieved by the University absorbing many AGTS operational functions and implementing improved processes and systems at the University.

With AGTS part of the overall University fund development efforts, we are also seeing significant benefits. Total giving this past academic year, including AGTS, was \$5.0M compared to \$2.5M last year – a 99% increase – with 353 first-time donors. In addition to these gifts, AGTS received a General Council grant of \$1.4M.

We also saw a 25% increase in unrestricted giving, including AGTS, over the past three years. This year our unrestricted giving exceeded \$1M.

In June, the Board of Trustees approved a recommendation for some structural changes, with a shift to a Vice President/

Dean of AGTS leadership model. Dr. George O. Wood, General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, stated, "This provides a strategic opportunity to live more fully into the consolidation and promise of enhanced ministerial education and preparation, with increased stewardship of resources."

With each step forward, we have embraced the opportunity to continue to design a structure and academic programs that actively engage all of our students and joint faculty in the unique missions of the seminary and the University at large.

The VP/Dean of AGTS reports directly to the University Provost/Executive Vice President on all academic matters of AGTS. The VP/Dean serves as a University Vice President and reports to the University President for matters related to church, external, and public relations. The VP/Dean also works with the President on fund development in collaboration with the University Advancement Office. The VP/Dean is a member of the President's Cabinet and University Planning Council and collaborates with University vice presidents on operational matters. The VP/Dean is the resource person to the Seminary Board of Advisors and is the liaison to the Association of Theological Schools and any other seminary associations.

The Board also approved Dr. George O. Wood to serve as Chancellor of AGTS reporting to and working directly with the University President. The Chancellor of AGTS is an ambassador and champion of the seminary within our Fellowship and with other publics and assists with fund development.

Dr. James Railey has agreed to delay his retirement and continue his service as Vice President/Dean of AGTS to ensure a smooth transition while a search is undertaken to find the new VP/Dean.

The University has now undertaken the search for the new Vice President/Dean of AGTS and welcomes inquiries and recommendations. For a full position description, please visit evangel.edu/job-openings/2017/06/20/vice-presidentdean-agts/

Each year as we commission a new group of graduates, I am reminded of the global reach of our graduates for the Kingdom. Today over 3,600 Evangel, CBC, and AGTS graduates are Assemblies of God credentialed ministers with over 200 serving as district, national and international leaders. My response is profound gratitude and prayer that we will continue to live into God's call and vision for Evangel and AGTS.

During the Society of Christian Philosophers Conference, which met at Evangel in the fall, Dr. Beckwith addressed the role of religion in the public square. He calls into question the common practice of disregarding, or discounting, religiously connected contributions to public discourse, especially in academia. He then made a case for the importance of religion in our social conversation and practice.

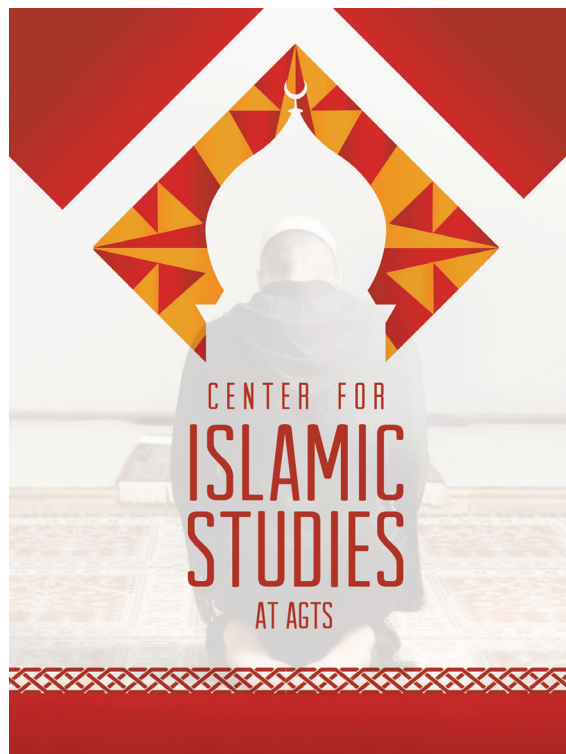
A GTS is fast becoming known for outstanding training in ministry to Muslims.

This year, in addition to the Islam in America seminar and the robust Summer Institute for Islamic Studies, AGTS was proud to cosponsor the “Spiritual Freedom From Islam” workshop in January with AG World Mission’s Global Initiative: Reaching Muslim Peoples.

The workshop featured Dr. Mark Durie—scholar, human rights activist, Anglican pastor, writing fellow at the Middle East Forum, and adjunct research fellow of the Arthur Jeffery Centre for the Study of Islam at Melbourne School of Theology. He has published many articles and books on Christian-Muslim relations, religious freedom and the language and culture of the Acehnese (an ethnic Muslim population in Indonesia).

The workshop covered the discipleship of Muslims who have turned to Christ as well as gender, theological, and leadership issues.

Meguiar, Corum, Sommers

Special guests provide unique learning experiences



In January, AGTS and Evangel were honored to host Barry Meguiar, president of Meguiar’s, Inc. Meguiar spoke to students in chapel and business classes at Evangel and at a luncheon for area business owners at AGTS.

Widely known as a successful businessman and TV host, Meguiar also has a passion to see lay people minister wherever they are planted. This desire led him to found Revival Outside the Walls, a ministry resource to encourage lay people to intentionally share their faith. ROTW challenges lay people to get off the bench (pew) and into the game where the adventure of being a Christian begins.

In March, Carl Sommer spoke in chapel at AGTS about Entrepreneurship and God’s Word.

Sommer is a Central Bible College alum, devoted educator, businessman, and author of award-winning children’s books. He is the founder and president of Advance Publishing, Inc. and Reliable EDM, a precision machining company that is the largest of its kind in North America.

An 86-year-old with a worldview that includes a healthy lifestyle, Sommers can do 100 push-ups and 25 chin-ups at a time and has no plans to retire.

Sommer was honored in 2011 as CBC’s distinguished alumnus of the year. He has appeared on numerous national radio and TV programs, including the Oprah Winfrey show.

Also in March, AGTS and Evangel hosted world-renowned scientist Ken Corum in chapel, he spoke in several classes at Evangel and at AGTS for a time of questions and answers.

Corum holds hundreds of patents. He and his brother, James, have spent more than 40 years creating a revolutionary technology that can transmit electricity wirelessly.

He is also the grandson of Lillie Corum, the first person in Springfield, Missouri, known to receive the baptism in the Holy Spirit. In 1907, evangelist Rachel Sizelove, made the long journey from Azusa Street in Los Angeles, California to Springfield to see her sister, Lillie Corum. As friends and neighbors stopped by to learn about the Azusa Street revival, prayer meetings began to overflow out of the Corum home into tent meetings that eventually formed the body of Central Assembly of God. The story is captured in the book, *The Sparkling Fountain*.

Dennis Ottalagano: SERVING WITH HONOR

Service is important to our military men and women and our veterans. It's important to Dennis Ottalagano, too. When he was 18, near the end of the Vietnam War, Dennis registered for the draft, passed his physical, and waited for a call to duty that never came.

So instead of military service, Dennis chose to serve God in another way. After graduating from Central Bible College, he enrolled at AGTS. "AGTS gave me the tools for ministry and opened doors to other areas, like military and medical chaplaincy, that were never in my mind when I entered the seminary," Dennis said.

Through AGTS, God opened many unplanned doors for Dennis and his wife, Noreen, including 21 years as a children's pastor, opportunities to speak at children's ministry conferences around the world, a stint as an adjunct professor at Bethany Bible College, and the successful pioneering of a church. This church started a motorcycle ministry called Advocates for Christ. Every Memorial Day, Dennis and other members of the group would ride to Balboa Park to celebrate with the vets of Outpost 0472.

As Dennis and his church became well known for honoring vets, they urged him to fill out an application to join the Vietnam Veterans of America, in spite of his never having served in the military. He was quickly accepted, and the Outpost 0472 vets voted him their chaplain for life. Now he counsels, prays with, encourages, and spiritually leads the vets during life's highs and lows, even as he leads the motorcycle group that follows the 0427 float in holiday parades.

In addition, Dennis is now the lead pastor at New Life Assembly of God in Ramona, California, and a hospice chaplain. This dovetails nicely with his work as a chaplain to veterans. Many of his dying patients have been Vietnam veterans; he has officiated at more than 200 memorial services for them and their loved ones.

"I've learned so much hanging around these vets," Dennis admits. "They have seen and done some horrible things; they've come home with scars that remind them daily of what war is like. They have helped me to become a better pastor, to be a good listener, and to walk beside a person in their suffering."

"God knew I wanted to serve in the military like my dad and other family members, but it just didn't happen," Dennis said. "God had other plans for how I could serve these men and women,

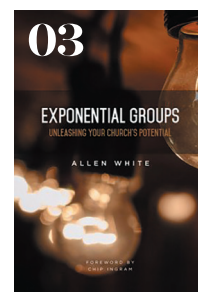

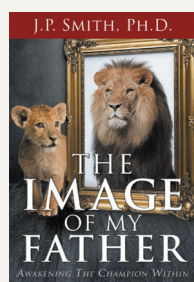
Alum of the Year

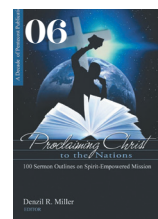

A LIFETIME OF GENEROSITY, A FUTURE OF INFLUENCE

Some people spend years searching for a cause or ministry they feel is worthy of a lifetime of giving and dedication. Bill and Janette Kassis were fortunate to find that cause early on.

For the past 50 years, they have devoted their time and resources to countless students and orphans. Their desire, now, is to influence future generations.

At the age of 12, Bill went to live at a Christian orphanage in the Middle East. When Bill was old enough to leave, he stayed on at the orphanage to help with the construction of new facilities, doing so even after he got a job at the airport.

Janette's parents heard about Bill from an elderly woman working with Youth for Christ. They wrote to him asking if he would be interested in coming to school in the United States.

In 1959, Bill was accepted into a community college and moved to Oakland, California, to live with Janette's family. He quickly discovered he wanted to be an engineer.

A LIFETIME OF GENEROSITY, A FUTURE OF INFLUENCE

Despite life's obstacles, Bill graduated and went on to earn his bachelor's in electrical engineering from California Polytechnic State University and his master's from San Jose State University, followed by a job with IBM. While working for IBM, he earned an advanced degree in engineering from Stanford University. Along the way, Bill and Janette fell in love and were married in 1961. He worked at IBM as they built their life together.

After visiting the orphanage a couple of times, Bill took a year's leave from IBM so he and Janette could travel to work in the Lebanese orphanage. "We lived at the orphanage in Lebanon and loved the contact with the boys," Janette reflected. "We also visited the Lillian Trasher Orphanage in Egypt several times."

In 1989, Bill transitioned from IBM to volunteer work with Bethany University. He taught a class on the book of Job while his wife volunteered in the employment office. As their volunteer work grew, they began to form a "family" of new relationships that offered fresh avenues for giving.

Over the years, Bill and Janette have provided tuition and found jobs for students. Now, they have a burden to reach the Arab world through students.

"We want to help students fulfill their calling to get the message and hope of Jesus Christ to that needy part of the world," Janette explained.

In order to continue their commitment to giving into the next generation, they have created a scholarship specifically for AGTS students who plan to minister in the Arab Middle East.

They believe in the work AGTS is doing and have devoted their resources to see it continue to be a strong base for the training of those who want to reach the Arab world for Christ in the power of the Spirit.

Heaven Welcomes Two Pillars of the Faith



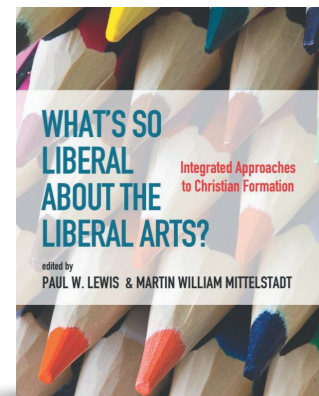
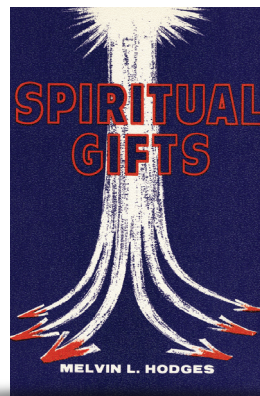
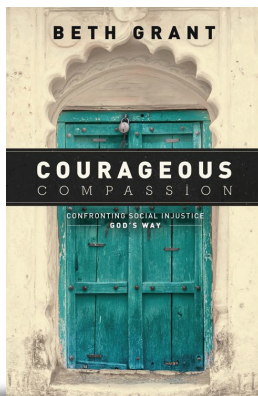
Loren Triplett and his wife, Milly, began serving as missionaries to Nicaragua in 1954, where Triplett served as director of Nicaragua Bible Institute and leader in the national church fellowship. In 1966, Triplett was appointed manager of Editorial Vida, now known as Life Publishers. In 1973, he went on to become the regional director of Latin America and the Caribbean and eventually the executive director of Assemblies of God World Missions, where he served from 1990 to 1997. After his retirement in 1997, Triplett and his family continued to have an effective ministry in the United States and overseas. He finished his 90-year adventure this side of heaven on Christmas Day 2016.



D.V. Hurst was a distinguished statesman, administrator, and visionary leader in the development of Christian higher education. He served in the AG National Sunday School Department for 15 years. He then assumed the presidency of Northwest University from 1966 to 1990 until he became president of Asia Theological Centre for Evangelism and Missions in Singapore. Most significant to AGTS, D.V. Hurst served as the chairman of the “For Such a Time” capital campaign, which raised \$6.2 million to build the current facilities. He went home to be with his Lord on December 28, 2016, at the age of 93.
